## Question for written answer E-000786/2024 to the Commission

Rule 138 **Leila Chaibi** (The Left)

Subject: Discrimination based on the requirement to provide proof of address to obtain residence

In countries such as Belgium or Denmark<sup>1</sup>, mobile EU citizens are required to register an address to obtain their right to residence in the country. This excludes people without a stable housing situation and those living in informal arrangements from obtaining residence, and therefore from accessing essential services and rights, such as social protection<sup>2</sup>, voting rights<sup>3</sup>, or opening a bank account<sup>4</sup>.

However, under Directive 2004/38/EC<sup>5</sup>, having an address is not a condition for EU citizens to be able to register as a resident in another Member State. This was already made clear by the Commission in an answer to a parliamentary question in 2017<sup>6</sup>.

Given that this requirement is current practice in several Member States:

- 1. Will the Commission investigate whether the requirement to have an address is in compliance with EU law, since it is a de facto obstacle to the exercise of the right to residence under Directive 2004/38/EC?
- 2. Will the Commission communicate with Member States on this issue, and where they require such a condition (proof of address), ask them to cease doing so?
