Subject: The situation with regard to tomato production in the Canaries
The tomato production and export sector in the Canary Islands finds itself in a serious situation which threatens its survival. Current tomato production represents $24.7 \%$ of the archipelago's agricultural production, and employs 27000 people, 12000 of them directly in farming, and 15000 indirectly. In 2001-2002, the Canaries exported 241840260 net kilos of tomatoes, equivalent to over 40 million in unit/bunch terms, for a total of 2630 hectares under cultivation. As a result of the advent of the socalled 'spoon virus', these figures have fallen spectacularly: production for 2006-2007 fell to 171 114448 net kilos, equivalent to 28 million in unit/bunch terms, from a total of 1943 hectares under cultivation. Using such possibilities as POSEICAN offers, the region's government has taken some measures to mitigate the situation, but these have not been enough to resolve the problem.

What information does the Commission have on the tomato sector crisis in the Canaries, an ultraperipheral region of the EU, and what measures does it think could be taken in order to maintain tomato production as a going concern and thus save the 27000 jobs involved?
