Subject: Case AD684 – anti-dumping proceeding concerning imports of ceramic tiles originating

from India and Turkey

On the basis of information that has been provided to me, and which has been verified by my office, it appears that the disproportionate anti-dumping sanctions described in case AD684 are likely to cause significant harm to many businesses in my region, as well as other EU businesses and EU consumers. There are at least a few producers of ceramic tiles in Poland that I am aware of that outsource their production to India. These are very popular products among EU consumers, and many EU sellers base their offerings on them. According to the data provided by the above-mentioned businesses, none of the prices of the products that they import to the European Union from India qualify as dumping prices, i.e. the export prices of the products they supply to the Union are not lower than the normal value of these products.

Given that the case directly concerns businesses from the region I represent (Podlaskie province, Poland), is the adverse impact of the potential imposition of anti-dumping measures being properly examined in the proceedings concerning case AD684:

- 1. on economic operators from EU Member States and, in particular, EU producers which manufacture their goods in India or Turkey and those which cooperate with them; and
- 2. on the customers of those businesses EU consumers?
