Subject: Plan to protect Russian citizens fleeing Putin's regime

Over one month ago, the Russian invasion of Ukraine began and with it the biggest humanitarian disaster to take place on European soil since the end of the Balkan war. Meanwhile, the Russian authorities are carrying out systematic reprisals against Russians who oppose the war. Anti-war protests are being violently suppressed and protesters locked up.
