Subject: Minimum income recipients from third countries

Since 2010, Germany has paid Hartz-IV benefits of around EUR 117 billion to citizens of other EU Member States and third-country nationals. In 2010, non-Germans accounted for 20% of the total number of beneficiaries, receiving around EUR 6.9 billion in Hartz-IV benefits, doubling to 40% by 2021 with payments rising to over EUR 13.2 billion. Of these amounts, around 45% went to people from the eight largest asylum countries. Since the end of 2021, the proportion of non-German Hartz-IV recipients has risen to 52%, placing them in the majority<sup>1</sup>.

- 1. What percentages of minimum income recipients in each of the EU Member States come from other Member States and third-countries respectively?
- 2. What are the annual amounts of minimum income paid to recipients in each category?
- 3. What percentage of recipients is made up of asylum seekers in each of the Member States?
