- 1. Congratulates the Council, and in particular the Finnish Presidency, for having decided to submit to the United Nations General Assembly, on behalf of the Union, a resolution on the abolition of the death penalty;
- 2. Calls on the Finnish Presidency and on Member States to ensure that the text of the above resolution makes explicit reference to the future establishment of a universal moratorium on executions;
- 3. Considers it moreover as being of the highest importance for the above resolution to provide for the appointment of a special rapporteur instructed to ensure implementation of the resolution's contents and propose mechanisms and actions designed to ensure genuine implementation of the resolution;
- 4. Welcomes the abolition of the death penalty in certain countries, in particular those of Central and Eastern Europe;
- 5. Expresses its concern at those countries that are proceeding to <u>reactivate</u> capital punishment despite having dispensed with it for many years;
- 6. Instructs its President to forward this resolution to the Council, the Commission and the United Nations Secretary-General.
