<u>The Beacon Project</u> Second Transatlantic Conference

BACKGROUND NOTE:

Thanks to the support provided by the National Endowment for Democracy, IRI's Beacon Project aims to support a stronger and broader transatlantic dialogue on how to jointly defend the core values of liberal democracy against threats from both outside and within. In order to develop this counter strategy, the Beacon Project will create a network comprised of representatives from political parties, party foundations and institutes, independent think tanks, non-governmental organizations and media outlets from the EU and its immediate neighborhood, e.g. the Balkans and the Eastern Partnership countries. To support the network, the Beacon Project will conduct polling and utilize ICT tracking tools to obtain fresh data on disinformation and anti-liberal messaging. Through the continued exchange of this research and other relevant insights from various counter-propaganda projects, including success stories and failures, we will facilitate the formulation of common strategies and future projects amongst members of the network or potentially for the network as such. Two standing round tables will serve as the primary structure of the network's work — a round table for political leaders and legislators and a round table convening civil society actors.

ROUND TABLE OUTLINE:

Based upon the successful discussions held at the first transatlantic meeting of the Beacon Project in January, the upcoming round table will now work toward the goal of creating a standing round table for experts and center-right and conservative political leaders that will look into legal and political measures of combating Russian influence in Central and Eastern Europe (CEE). The composition of this working group will be primarily political and legal representatives and other experts from the partner countries. Through sharing information on measures that have been taken or can potentially be taken in local, national, and European legislative and legal bodies the round table aims to refine these approaches and build a more unified response amongst the partners.
