WASHINGTON, DC

City Population: 632,323

Washington, DC is located at the confluence of the Potomac and Anacostia Rivers, between the states of Maryland and Virginia. Named for George Washington and Christopher Columbus, the city was created as the seat of the federal government by an act of Congress in 1790. Pierre L'Enfant, a French soldier and engineer, laid out the plans for the federal city. Despite L'Enfant's grand plans, the city did not grow rapidly. It suffered a major setback during the War of 1812 when British troops entered Washington and burned the public buildings (when the President's house was rebuilt, the fire-blackened surfaces were painted white, thus inspiring the name "White House"). The District of Columbia grew slowly but steadily. By the time the Civil War erupted in 1861, it was a busy city of 75,000 residents. While the population of the city today is only approximately 600,000, the greater Washington area – including the suburbs in Maryland and Virginia – has a population of 5.5 million people, making it the seventh-largest urban area in the U.S.

Washington serves as the capital of the United States, but it is not part of any state. The city was administered by Congress until 1974, when "home rule," or government by an elected mayor and city council, was granted. The residents of the District are represented in Congress by a non-voting delegate who may take part in hearings, floor debate, and other functions of Congress and, under the 23rd Amendment to the Constitution, has voting representation in the presidential Electoral College. However, because it is not a state, the District does not have a vote in either the Senate or the House of Representatives.

Washington's major business is national and international politics. The leading private industry is tourism, with fourteen to fifteen million visitors coming to the city every year. Recently many research and development companies in electronics, physics, and other sciences have located themselves in the Washington, DC area. The city has also experienced tremendous growth in the financial and Internet sectors. Nearly all of the top 500 corporations in the U.S. have offices here. Washington is also a major educational and research center. Within its city limits are American University, The Catholic University of America, Georgetown University, the George Washington University, Howard University, The University of the District of Columbia and Gallaudet University, a renowned university for the deaf. In addition, many political, economic and medical research institutes are located in Washington.

The National Mall, located between Constitution and Independence Avenues, forms the axis of the city, with the United States Capitol Building to the east and the Lincoln Memorial to the west. The Smithsonian Institution – including the famous Air and Space Museum, the Hirshhorn Museum and Sculpture Garden, the Sackler Gallery of Near East and Asian Art and the Museum of African Art, the Freer Gallery, the Museum of American History, and the Museum of Natural History – borders the Mall to the north and south. The White House, the Washington Monument, the National Gallery of Art, the Vietnam Memorial, the National Archives (which exhibits the original U.S. Constitution and the Declaration of Independence), the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum, and the Thomas Jefferson Memorial are also located on or near the National Mall.

Topic: Overview of the main functions of the Federal Election Committee.

Ellen L. Weintraub took office as a Member of the United States Federal Election Commission (FEC) on December 9, 2002. Commissioner Weintraub has twice served as Chair of the Commission, for calendar years 2003 and 2013. Prior to her appointment, Ms. Weintraub was Of Counsel to Perkins Coie LLP and a member of its Political Law Group. There, she counseled clients on federal and state campaign finance and election laws, political ethics, nonprofit law, recounts, and lobbying regulation. During the election contest arising out of the 1996 election of Senator Mary Landrieu (D-LA), Ms. Weintraub served on the legal team that advised the Senate Rules Committee. Her tenure with Perkins Coie represented Ms. Weintraub's second stint in private practice, having previously practiced as a litigator with the New York law firm of Cahill Gordon & Reindel. Before joining Perkins Coie, Ms. Weintraub was Counsel to the Committee on Standards of Official Conduct for the U.S. House of Representatives (the House Ethics Committee). Like the Commission, the Committee on Standards is a bipartisan body, evenly divided between Democratic and Republican members. Ms. Weintraub's work focused on implementing the Ethics Reform Act of 1989 and subsequent changes to the House Code of Official Conduct. She also served as editor in chief of the House Ethics Manual and as a principal contributor to the Senate Ethics Manual. While at the Committee, Ms. Weintraub counseled Members on investigations and often had lead responsibility for the Committee's public education and compliance initiatives.

Ms. Weintraub received her B.A., cum laude, from Yale College and her J.D. from Harvard Law School. A native New Yorker, she is a member of the New York and District of Columbia bars and the Supreme Court bar.

JACKSONVILLE, FLORIDA

February 10 - 13, 2016

City Population: 836,507

Established as a seaport in 1832, Jacksonville is a city with more land area than New York City and Los Angeles combined – 874 square miles – with a population of just under a million, but growing. The St. Johns River flows through the heart of the city. While the state of Florida is known for its retiree population, Jacksonville has the youngest median age in the state at 35 years, compared to a state average of 41. It is young and family-oriented, and its diversity grows through refugee resettlement as well as corporate global growth.

Jacksonville is the leading transportation and distribution hub in the state with the fastest growing port on the East Coast. The area's economy is balanced among distribution, financial services, biomedical technology, consumer goods, information services, manufacturing, and other industries. Multiple military facilities give Jacksonville the third largest naval presence in the country.

Situated along the St. Johns River, Jacksonville operates the largest urban park system in the United States, including the historical Timucuan Ecological and Historical Preserve and Big and Little Talbot Island State Parks offering miles of undeveloped beaches and trails. Public beaches span 20 miles along the Atlantic coast. To create a more effective government, and better management of its growing parks and land systems, the city of Jacksonville and Duval County consolidated its government structures in 1968. This type of consolidated government is unique and helpful in keeping with Florida's progressive Sunshine State laws regarding ethics and transparency in government.

In the early 20th century Jacksonville was known as the "Hollywood of the South" for its film industry and the "Harlem of the South" for its rich African American culture. With a growing population, a strong economy, diverse cultural and recreational opportunities and abundant natural resources, Jacksonville continues to distinguish itself as a very dynamic and progressive city.

TALLAHASSEE, FLORIDA

City Population: 155,171

Tallahassee is the capitol of Florida. In a region of rolling hills, live oak forests and rivers, Tallahassee is noted for its beautiful gardens, nearby lakes, and the Gulf of Mexico coast, with some of the best fishing in the area.

While state government and education, namely Florida State University and Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University, have long been the major employers in Tallahassee, other industries have developed as well. Tallahassee is rapidly becoming the market center for the surrounding counties. It is also one of the fastest-growing cities in the country.

Tallahassee is governed by an elected mayor and four city commissioners. Tallahassee is served by the newspaper *The Tallahassee Democrat*. Florida State University and Florida A&M are both located in the area. Points of interest include the Florida State Capitol Building, built in 1845; Wakulla Springs, a wildlife sanctuary with glass-bottomed boat tours and a cypress forest; and Maclay State Gardens, with beautiful azaleas, camellias, and oriental magnolias surrounding a beautifully-restored house. Tallahassee has a large African-American minority community and smaller Hispanic and Asian communities.

Florida was a frontier state in the early 19th century, with only two cities of note, St. Augustine and Pensacola. In 1823, the legislature founded Tallahassee as a more accessible and permanent seat of government midway between the two cities. Tallahassee was one of the only two cities in the Confederacy that did not fall to Union forces during the Civil War. From the Capitol's modest beginning as a rough wooden structure, the state government has grown to become Tallahassee's largest industry.
