TEL AVIV is located in central-west Israel on the coast of the Mediterranean. As the second largest city in Israel (pop. 400,000), Tel Aviv is the country's financial capital and a major performing arts and business center. The city is renowned for its cosmopolitan lifestyle, beaches, bars, restaurants, cafes, shopping, and landmark neighborhoods. According to various travel publications, the city has been praised as one of the world's most creative cities, the best gay city in 2011, one of the world's best beach cities, and home to the most beautiful people in the world. With 2.5 million international visitors annually, Tel Aviv is the fifth-most-visited city in the Middle East & Africa. Founded in 1909 by the Jewish community of Jaffa, an ancient port city, Tel Aviv was the first modern Hebrew city. Tel Aviv and Jaffa officially merged into a single municipality in 1950.

Convening in Jerusalem, the 120-member KNESSET is Israel's unicameral parliament. Knesset members (MKs) are typically elected every four years. Unlike many national legislatures, Members of Knesset do not represent a district, but are elected as representatives of a party list. Members of Knesset elect the president and the prime minister, approve the cabinet, and pass all laws. The Knesset is made up of 15 committees such as the Finance Committee, the Committee on the Status of Women, and the Foreign Affairs and Defense Committee.

On the northernmost tip of Israel, the **GOLAN HEIGHTS** has served as the border between Lebanon, Syria, Jordan, and Israel since 1967 when Israel gained control of the region. The region accounts for 15% of Israel's water source and is home to several farming and agricultural communities as well as Israel's booming wine industry. At a strategically valuable location and elevation, the Golan has been the subject of several border disputes between Israel and her neighbors.

JERUSALEM is the capital of modern Israel. A city holy to Jews, Christians, and Muslims, Jerusalem lies in the Judean hills about 32 km from the Jordan River. In the 1947 UN Partition Plan, Jerusalem was to be an international city administered by the United Nations. After the 1947-1948 War, the city of Jerusalem was split between Transjordan and Israel, with the Old City entirely under Jordanian control. During the 1967 War, Israel gained control of the Old City and annexed it into Israel. All branches of government are located in Jerusalem, including the Knesset (parliament), the Supreme Court, and the residences of the Prime Minister and President. The status of Jerusalem, and especially its holy places, remains a core issue in the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. Today, the city's 125 km2, comprising both East and West Jerusalem, is populated by over 800,000 residents.

RAMALLAH serves as the administrative center for the Palestinian National Authority, located 10 kilometers north of Jerusalem. Though historically a Christian city, Ramallah's population of 25,500 is now primarily Muslim. Ramallah is home to the Palestinian Prime Minister's office, the Palestinian Authority, and many international NGOs and foreign representative offices. It was also a major site of violence during the First and Second Intifadas.

The **OLD CITY OF JERUSALEM** is divided into four quadrants – the Muslim, Jewish, Christian, and Armenian quarters – each of which has a distinctive feel and history. Encompassing less than one square kilometer, the Old City is filled with sites of rich historical and archeological significance for Jews, Christians and Muslims, including the Western Wall, Temple Mount, al-Aqsa Mosque, and the Church of the Holy Sepulcher. Israel considers all of Jerusalem its national capital, although Israel's jurisdiction over the entire city is contested.

YAD VASHEM is Israel's official memorial to the victims of the Holocaust. Established in 1953, Yad Vashem upholds four pillars of remembrance: commemoration, education, research, and documentation. A 4,200 square meter complex, Yad Vashem is home to several memorials, the Holocaust History Museum, archives, an educational institute, outdoor commemorative sites, and a synagogue. As the "pioneer of Holocaust museums worldwide," Yad Vashem tells the story of the Holocaust through testimonies, diaries, artifacts, films, letters, and art. Though primarily a commemoration of individual experiences, it leaves visitors with an understanding of the Holocaust's universal and contemporary implications.
