

| Coordinator:<br>Pier Luigi Parcu | The European Commission has often promoted a "human-centric" vision of digital technologies as the guiding principle for both public and private actors when developing and deploying new technologies. As clearly expressed in the "Declaration on European Digital Rights and Principles" (22 January 2022), choosing a human-centric approach to the digital transition means that "putting people at the center of the digital transition is a key priority" for Europe. Aims such as fostering participation in the digital public space, increasing safety, security, empowerment of individuals, and ensuring freedom of choice in the digital environment are associated to this vision. In this respect, there are still many challenges associated with the digital transformation that need to be addressed and, specifically, the enormous digital divide that many countries continue to experience nowadays. Considering that the digital divide policies are focused primarily on physical access to infrastructures and |

| Coordinator:<br>Erik Jones | Current turbulence is surely more than the progression of "just" another business cycle. To gauge what the current conjunction of events might mean and the possible path ahead, the McKinsey Global Institute (MGI) took a historical view on the structural tectonics that have reshaped today's world. Today's disruptions are the fourth "earthquake" since the end of World War II, the other three being the immediate aftermath of the conflict, the 1970s oil crisis, and the reshaping of Europe as the Soviet Union broke up. With our panelists and participants, we'd like to explore a number of questions, including: What are the most critical disruptions changing the world today? Are there parallels from the past from which we can learn, helping us to write a new narrative of progress? How could the next wave of technologies impact work and society? How can we most effectively ensure we have the energy we need while forging along the path to net zero? | Erik Jones                 | European regions require technological capabilities to green and digitize their<br>economies in line with the twin transition. These capabilities, however, are not<br>spread evenly across European regions. Making matters worse, relevant innovation<br>activities are highly concentrated in more developed regions, while inter-regional<br>collaboration is both rare and tends to occur domestically. As a result, much of<br>Europe's technology potential remains untapped and opportunities for greater<br>cohesion unrealized. In our new study "Technological capabilities and the twin<br>transition in Europe", we map opportunities for regional collaboration to build the<br>technologies of the future. | EUI Scientific                       | Equality and its Pivotal Role in European Democracies- 2023 and beyond  |
| Coordinator:<br>Ruth Rubio-<br>Marín | Never have equality and non-discrimination played a more crucial role in the defence<br>of European democracies. This panel will examine upcoming progress and possible<br>struggles around these issues. At the EU level the Equality acquis is gaining<br>momentum, as exemplified by the appointment of the first ever Commissioner for<br>equality and anti-racism Coordinator, and by the adoption of the Gender Equality and<br>LGBTIQ Equality Strategies in 2020. Simultaneously, however, we note that progress<br>and backlash on equality continue to coexist in a growing number of Member States.<br>Women's rights and the rights of LGBTI+ communities, in particular, are under<br>constant attackoften used as a means to mobilize support for marginalization and<br>exclusion via hate speech. In Poland, for example, women's sexual and reproductive<br>rights continue to be contested; and clashes continue with so-called LGBTI-free<br>municipalities. In Germany, the struggle around the 'self-identification act' and for<br>the acceptance of the trans community is ongoing. But impacted communities<br>around Europe have taken to the streets and to social media to stand up for their<br>rights and advance them. Our discussion will explore how to engage with legal<br>frameworks and social dynamics to ensure that democracy in Europe remains based<br>on human rights and fundamental freedoms. But, beyond legal frameworks, we will<br>also examine how perception functions in embedding rights politically and socially.<br>Our discussion will therefore also cover what researchers have learned about<br>attitudes in the EU, especially those at the intersection of misogyny and support for<br>extreme parties. |

|                                      | Last December, the Council of the EU reached a common position on the proposed framework for a European digital identity (eID). The aim is to ensure universal access to secure and trustworthy eID and authentication by means of a personal digital wallet. By paving the way for a fully harmonised digital identity, the framework is triggering ground-breaking developments. Two consortia, EWC and NOBID, have been selected and funded to carry out large-scale pilots focused on facilitating travel, payments and trust services across borders. More solutions are being developed by the private sector, including large European banks. However, several policy questions remain unaddressed. How to ensure full security and interoperability of solutions across the EU, as well as users' control over their data? This session takes stock of recent developments and discusses how to best implement the Digital Wallet, in line with European values.  |

|                | harmful content online. The Acts provide for the creation of various coordinators, boards and monitoring bodies that can ensure compliance with their guidelines and        |
|                | regulations, but civil society and media platforms themselves have important roles to   |
|                | play too. The success of the Code of Practice in particular, will depend on actions   |
|                | taken by the media platforms that pledged to support it. How will these platforms   |
|                | empower users, researchers and the fact-checking community? Will (more) data be   |

platforms for their own gain, and will decisive action be taken to demonetize disinformation? The experts on the panel will debate these issues to gain a better understanding of what works in combatting harmful and disruptive (online) content, what can be improved in the EU's battle against disinformation, and in what direction the EU is headed on these matters.
